Hemlock Woolly Adelgid Treatment Cost-Share Program

The Forest Health Program is pleased to announce that they are now offering a Hemlock Woolly Adelgid (HWA) Treatment Cost-Share Program for the treatment of qualifying eastern and Carolina hemlock trees. This program is open to landowners and organizations statewide and applications will be accepted on a rolling basis. Approved applicants will receive a reimbursement of <u>up to</u> 100% of treatment costs for approved HWA control methods. Landowners may apply with <u>Form 6.7 Hemlock</u> <u>Woolly Adelgid Treatment Cost-Share Program Application</u>, and full program details can be found in <u>Policy and Procedures 06-004 Forest Pest Treatment Cost-Share Program</u>. Applications Open for the Urban and Community Forestry Grant Assistance Program

In a news release this week, DOF, in cooperation with the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Forest Service (USFS), announced the availability of grant funding for the 2023 installment of the Urban and Community Forestry (U&CF) Grant Assistance Program. Virginia received a total allocation of \$6,600,000. Distributed over a four-year period, grants are awarded to civic groups, communities, local governments, tribal organizations, non-profit organizations, neighborhood associations, public educational institutions, and state agencies. "This historic allocation of funds for Virginia communities will enable us to reach all parts of the state," said Lara Johnson, DOF Urban and Community Forestry Program Coordinator.

To apply, proposals must be submitted to DOF's System Access Portal for Forestry Grants. All applications must be submitted online by 9 p.m. on Nov. 3. For more information about the U&CF Grant Program, including the RFA and grants portal user guide, visit our website.

Forest Management Academy

The 2023 Forest Management Academy was held last week at Sweet Briar College. To ensure DOF provides the highest level of information and service, DOF employees need the most current knowledge to form scientific recommendations. Approximately 65 newer staff (15 non-field and 50 field) were in attendance, providing an excellent opportunity for agency leaders to communicate directly with DOF's "greener" employees and provide the bigger picture of DOF. Approximately 40 additional (more seasoned) employees attended and expanded their knowledge base and sharpened their skills.

On Monday, the opening session kicked off with a presentation by State Forester Rob Farrell that set

the stage for the week as he discussed our history, mission, goals and challenges. The State Forester also presented a Certified Forest Stewardship Award to Lisa J. Powell, Ph.D., Director of the Center for Human and Environmental Sustainability, Associate Professor of Environmental Science and Agriculture, and STEM Division Head at Sweet Briar for the college's ongoing commitment to campus forest management. Deputy State Forester **Ed Zimmer** facilitated a panel session to introduce program, section leaders and the regional foresters to staff. An evening BBQ, social time, as well as the outdoor showing of the new American chestnut foundation film, "Clear Day Thunder, Rescuing the American Chestnut," was enjoyed by attendees.

Additional sessions focused on customer service and selling forestry, emerging issues (solar, nutrients, forest land, carbon, etc.), forest literacy, and several field classes on forest management, health, invasive species, data collection, tree establishment and best practices. DOF staff – namely Watershed Program Manager **Caitlin Verdu**, Forest Technician **Emily Wotton**, Research Program Manager **Zoe Bergman** and Area Forester **Amy Bigger** – carved out time to help organize and staff a





"Careers in Forestry and State Government" panel where they shared their experiences working in forestry and what's possible for students considering natural resources careers (Forest Health Program Manager Lori Chamberlin helped organize the event. "It was an incredibly well-attended event by SBC standards (16 students plus several staff and faculty), and all of the students who attended (several had left for afternoon classes prior to the photo) walked away saying how valuable the panel was., said Dr. Lisa J. Powell, Ph.D., Director of the Center for Human and Environmental Sustainability, Associate Professor of Environmental Science and Agriculture, and STEM Division Head, by email. "The four women from DOF who spoke with the students were so generous with their time

and advice, and all were inspirations to our students in showing what is possible in future natural resources careers. One first-year student (who had been a bit quiet during the session)

came up to me afterward and said 'Working for the Dept of Forestry is exactly what I want to do.

How can we incorporate more forestry into my studies?' So, we are going to be working on a plan for internships, projects, etc."

Kudos to Forest Management Director **Dean Cumbia** and staff for planning and implementing another great academy.



The Annual Land Trust Alliance Rally was held in Portland, Oregon last week. The Virginia-based attendees (including DOF representatives Forestland Conservation Coordinator **Clint Folks** and Forestland Conservation **Specialist Charles Lacy**. Rally is composed of learning sessions and networking events focused on land conservation. Classroom sessions took an in-depth look at solar energy, carbon markets, conservation easements and a variety of topical issues.
