State Forest Regulations

To ensure your safety, please adhere to the following State Forest regulations:

- Hunting and trapping with State Forest Use Permit in accordance with state hunting regulations.
 - Fishing in designated areas only with State Forest Use Permit in accordance with state fishing regulations.
 - Biking and horse riding in designated areas only with State Forest Use Permit.
 - State Forest Use Permits required only for anyone age 16 and older.
 - No removal of any tree, plant or mineral.
- Remove all trash.
 - No camping, ATVs or public display of alcohol.
 - No fireworks, campfires or open air fires of any type.
 - Gasoline motorized boats are not permitted.
 - Vehicular traffic on established roads only; not permitted on gated roads.
